BIG BROTHER GOES THE DISTANCE

Originally from Keswick, ON, a job opportunity brought Simon and his (now) wife to Hamilton. He settled in the area, started a new job, bought a house, got married and became a Big Brother within a two year span. Though it was a busy time with lots of change, Simon wanted to give back to his community. "I wanted to be a role model for someone and make sure they were on a good path," Simon says. At the time Simon was (and still is) aspiring towards a career in law enforcement, which was part of what drew him to the charity.

When Simon first met his Little Brother two years ago, he says, "Darius was withdrawn, he didn't want to talk and was very shy." At the time, Darius had a poor attendance record at school and his grades were lacking. "I took on the role of being a friend and mentor at the same time," Simon says, and ever since, "I have always maintained the balance of being the friend, the 'authority figure,' as a police officer in training, and a mentor."

Within their first few months together, Simon and Darius' bond quickly grew. Then, four months into their match, Simon suddenly lost his job. He and his wife made the difficult decision to move back to their hometown of Keswick.

Though a one-hour and forty-five minute drive would now exist between them, Simon refused to end their match—he did not want to let Darius down, nor did he want to break the bond they had been forming. Simon continued as Darius' Big Brother.

Now a year-and-a-half later, Simon and Darius have built a strong friendship. They see each other biweekly and keep in touch in between by phone or text. Simon says they have very similar interests: "He has so much personality and reminds me a lot of myself when he was my age."

"I am most proud that he is comfortable enough to come to me about anything," Simon says, explaining that they have built a trust. Darius not only reaches out to Simon as someone to talk to, but also when he needs advice or help with a decision. "There's nothing he wouldn't tell me," says Simon.

Thirteen-year-old Darius is off to high-school in September, and Simon is very pleased. Over the past two years, Simon has encouraged Darius to do well — at school, home and in general. Simon has also been a big advocate of respectful language and behavior to adults and authority figures. As a result, Darius' attitude at home and towards school improved, as did his grades and attendance. Simon explained that Darius was held accountable, and "He didn't want to disappoint me. His grades went up; he wanted me to be at his graduation." And of course Simon was this past June.

Simon's favourite part of being a Big Brother is the difference he is making: "Every day I see Darius improve. I know that I'm doing something good and I'm sending him on the right path. It gives me satisfaction knowing that I am having a positive impact."


